

SIRS Researcher Quick Start Guide

SIRS Researcher is a general reference database containing thousands of full-text articles exploring social, scientific, health, historic, business, economic, political and global issues. Articles and graphics are selected from more than 1,600 domestic and international publications and are indexed primarily according to Library of Congress subject headings.

Search Tabs allow access to the three search methods, including Quick Search, Advanced Search and Topic Browse, a listing of Database Features, as well as the SIRS Interactive Citizenship series (if licensed).

Help Topics are grouped to be easily accessible from anywhere in the database.

- Help launches context-sensitive help.
- How to Cite details how to cite articles and Internet sites retrieved from SIRS Researcher.
- Dictionary & Thesaurus assists users in defining words, checking spelling, choosing the perfect word and more.

The top **Reference Bar** provides links to functional and reference aids.

- Home returns to the portal page.
- Back returns to the previously viewed page.

- My Research includes:
 - o Tagged List displays articles added to the list by selecting the tag icon.
 - o Search History contains a list of all searches performed during a session and provides links to return to the search results.
 - o Session Save provides the ability to save your search history and tagged list by keying in a user name and password.
- Educators' Resources compiles a collection of materials designed to help educators and librarians use Researcher. It includes easy access to our **search by standards** feature, which makes it easy to mine resources connected to U.S. state, national, or Canadian Provincial standards.
- Toolbox provides a single point of access to all reference materials.
- Log-out ends the user session, clearing the search history and tagged list for the next user.

Leading Issues

SIRS Leading Issues feature is dynamically updated daily with new content! New topics are added along with "Your Top 10 Choices" -- a list that is solely driven by end-user searches and is updated monthly. Best of all, the new Pro/Con and myAnalysis tabs make exploring the opposing viewpoints of our time easier.

Part 2: Search Methods

Targeted Search

Simply click the new Images search link at the top of the main search page and find any of tens of thousands of photographs, charts and maps to simply copy and paste into reports, presentations and more.

Subject Headings Search

Subject Headings Search is useful when you have a specific research topic in mind and you want to use a subject index to quickly locate articles related to that particular topic.

Keyword Search

Keyword Search is useful when you want to locate articles based on your own combination of key words and phrases.

Standards Search

Move your mouse over the words Educators' Resources at the top, then click Standards. Choose your location, then a standards set. Drill down to a specific standards node and select See Resources. SIRS assets directly applicable to that standard will appear.

Topic Browse

Use to locate results by exploring topics and subtopics in a multilevel tree.

Part 3: Analyzing Your Results

The numbers of results returned for each source type may list up to 1000+ results. Selecting the corresponding link may further narrow search results to: Newspapers, Magazines and References.

Summary: "The United States was not the first country in the last hundred years to occupy Iraq. That distinction belongs to the United Kingdom, which seized the provinces of Basra, Baghdad, and Mosul from the Ottoman Empire at the end of World War I and formally took control of the new country in 1920, under a mandate from the League of Nations. A number of pundits have recently noted the parallels between the United Kingdom's experience eight decades ago and the United States' today. The comparisons, however, have generally centered on the early and middle phases of both occupations. Too few have focused on the ignominious end of the United Kingdom's reign in Mesopotamia and the lessons those events hold for the United States today. In fact, Washington's current position bears a strong resemblance to London's in the late 1920s, when the British were responsible for the tutelage of a fledgling Iraqi state suffering from immature institutions, active insurgencies, and the interference of hostile neighbors." Part 4: Working Within the Full-Text Document

The full-text article is accessed by clicking the **article title**. The article display page lists the source, date, page number(s), article title and author. In addition, any search term(s) used to locate the article are bolded within the text. The [1st Keyword](#) link scrolls the page to the first occurrence of such a key word. The arrow  indicators scroll the page to either the previous or next key word instances. In addition, the following features are available:

 Results List	Results List returns to the previous search results list.
 Tag	Tag adds the article or document to your Tagged list enabling you to e-mail, save, or create a bibliography.
 E-mail	E-mail sends the full text, source, summary and,/or graphics to your personal e-mail address.
 Clean Copy for Printing	Clean Copy for Printing loads a printer-friendly version of the article text, removing all keyword indicators and, inline graphics.
 Source	Source loads the article source.
 Summary	Summary loads the article summary.
 Descriptors	Descriptors loads a list of words which describe the subject matter and, link to related resources.
 Graphics	Graphics loads accompanying graphics or graphics list.
 Printable PDF	Printable PDF loads a printable version in Adobe's Portable Document Format.
 Bookmark	Bookmark creates a shortcut to a clean copy of the article text and, saves it in Internet Explorer's Favorites list for up to 60 days.
 Top	Top scrolls the window to the top of the page.
